#### A culture of care

Catholic schools know that every child (and every family) is different. That's why we focus on the individual, on cooperation and collaboration with parents to create happy, well-adjusted students and young people with the knowledge and life skills – plus the sense of purpose – needed in our increasingly complicated world.

Catholic education is striving to be a leader in child safety. We are working to build the truly inclusive school communities (where parents are partners) that research tells us improve the academic, social and emotional wellbeing of students.

# Academic excellence with real-life benefits

Independent studies show how the Catholic education difference is paying dividends.

Catholic schools across Melbourne shine in literacy and numeracy – the crucial building blocks of learning - returning results above the state average in NAPLAN tests and the Victorian Certificate of Education.

University of Melbourne research shows that a Catholic education adds an average of six ATAR points at the career-defining end of a student's school journey, while a Curtin University study has found that Australians who attended Catholic schools enjoy a wage premium of around 10%.

But academic achievement is only part of a Catholic education. The Curtin University research also found Catholic school graduates enjoy some of the highest levels of life satisfaction and happiness.

#### **Underpinning success**

We can't deliver the education your children deserve, however, without proper support from state and federal governments.

At last year's Victorian state election, both Labor and the Coalition committed to unprecedented levels of support for capital works for Catholic schools. We'll be making sure their counterparts in Canberra stick to their commitments in the lead-up to the federal election, expected in May.

## A proud history, a bright future

Academic results, affordability and strong enrolments all point to a flourishing future for Catholic education in Victoria.

We are building on a long and proud history that dates back almost to the very beginnings of European settlement in the Port Phillip Bay area.

While the face of Catholic education may have changed, as schools once dominated by Irish immigrants and their descendants have welcomed new arrivals from across Europe, the Christian communities of the Middle East, Vietnam and other Asian nations and, most recently, Africa, the principles that underpin our mission remain the same.

We are committed to providing quality, accessible, faith and values-based schooling to all those who want it.

It's clear parents appreciate the choice. The five new primary schools opened around the greater Melbourne area in 2018 have been followed by two more this year. 2020 will see the opening of our first new Catholic secondary college in a decade and, in the first few years of the coming decade, it's expected to be followed by as many as two more secondary schools and nine new primaries.

Catholic schools are seen as more than places of education, but vital community hubs – centres that provide a sense of certainty and purpose and enduring values as Melbourne's population booms.

A Catholic education develops engaged and purposeful young people able to thrive and make a difference in our complex twenty-first century world – even though total government recurrent and capital funding for Catholic schools nationally is almost 20% lower than for the government sector.

Last year parent power enabled us to overturn the former Turnbull government's unfair funding policies that threatened the future of all too many Catholic schools.

Both the Coalition and Labor governments are committed to new and more efficient funding mechanisms that ensure Catholic education receives appropriate support.

As we approach the federal election (expected in May) and after, we will be working with school communities to ensure the major parties honour their promises so the affordable, accessible, quality Catholic education we all value can continue to make its contribution to the community.
